Tudor day with Welsh National Opera


Little Moreton Hall hosts singers from Welsh National Opera on Thursday, 24th October.

Finally, in 1837, came *Roberto Devereux* (an alleged lover of Queen Elizabeth I) The leading female characters of the operas Anna Bolena, Maria Stuarda, and Roberto Devereux are often referred to as the "three Donizetti queens"

The duet Sul Suo Capo Aggravi *Un Dio* between Anna and Jane Seymour is considered one of the finest in the operatic repertoire.

The British synth player had chart success in the 1980s with hits like Windpower, Hyperactive! and She Blinded Me With Science and the Invisible Lighthouse Tour sees Dolby take his latest film project on the road, and present it to audiences as a theatrical expe-

Michaelmas Mop Fair at Little Moreton

Visitors to Little Moreton Hall will be offered apprenticeships in trades such as scribe (writing with a quill pen), apothecary (mixing potions), chandler (making beeswax candles) and seamstress (sewing and embroidering) at the weekend.

The occasion is a traditional

Michaelmas Mop Fair, staged at the hall on Saturday and Sunday. Daphne Mayer, National Trust visitor experience officer at the hall, said: "In Medieval and Tudor times the mop fairs were events where labourers, servants and tradesmen were hired. They were held at Michaelmas because that was the start and end of the farm-

ing year.
"For the workers, the fairs were serious business. If you failed to find employment for the next 12 months, starvation was a real threat.'

Visitors will be shown what to do and once they have got the hang of the skills, they are given a mop badge to show what trade they are apprenticed to. Then mas-ter of the house William Moreton (John Deakin), will attach a ribbon to the mop badge, to show

they have been hired.

Members of The Tudor and Stuarts Living History Society will be on hand to provide more information. Musicians from the society will also add a bit of mer-

riment.
Ms Mayer added: "At Little Moreton Hall we try to give visi-tors a real idea of what everyday life was like in the 16th century, when the hall was being built. The Mop Fair is an element of that Last year it was very popular with visitors, especially the younger ones. Some of them managed to be hired for about half a dozen different trades."

Little Moreton Hall's mop fair runs on Saturday and Sunday (Michaelmas Day) between 11am and 5pm.
